We would like to draw your attention to several points of interest that were discussed at the last committee meeting on September 15th.


Arrangement for indoor and outdoor meetings is of concern as we want to continue to deliver items of interest to our members.

Joined RNHS in 1968. Elizabeth was an amazing hard-worker for us in the early days of the Society:

Elizabeth was a school teacher, and when the Society left their indoor venue (Oakham VCVC), in 1968, she was instrumental in negotiations with her school (Burley Road C of E school), Oakham, and organised the move to their hall, for the indoor meetings; which was to last many years, until we again moved to the present venue, VAR Conference Centre.

Miss Northen held the following posts: during the 1970s (Programme Secretary), and (Annual Report proof reader), in the 1980s. Committee member: team member of the Egleton Church Project, and a regular, with the now defunct Clipsham Quarry Survey Group.



In addition to all that: was very involved in providing the Cheese and Wine, and refreshments at the many social occasions, held by the RNHS, during this era; especially being a member of the editorial team, who produced the 25th Anniversary book. Elizabeth is still a member.
