
# **Terry Mitcham**

2016 was an exciting year for local bird watchers with several rarities ■ at Rutland Water – Surf Scoter (a County first), Long-billed Dowitcher and Roseate Tern. Other notable birds ● were Great Skua, Great Grey Shrike and Yellow-browed Warbler.

As usual wildfowl and waders featured prominently at the reservoirs with high counts of wildfowl and an impressive list of 31 passage and breeding waders. Woodlands provided much of interest with winter (and roding) Woodcock, Lesser Spotted Woodpeckers and Nightingales at Rutland Water, where habitat management is paying off for many species and not only birds. Wildfowl counts at the Beaumont Chase Farm CBC (now in its 25th year) continued. The accompanying map shows that there were at least some records from most parts of the County, except for notable gaps towards the north-west. Perhaps it is now time for a push into frontier country?

Commentary

In 2016, 63 species were seen, 4 fewer than in 2015, in total 40 species were holding 309 territories or identified nests.

In 2015 the territories or nests count was 274.

## Individual species notes

Mute Swan	Bred: BGP, RW and EBR, but failed at Ext Park as well as FHP (both pairs)
Whooper Swan	Two seen over Wg 16.01 and 7 were at RWEgl, 18.01 and 24.02. 12 flew over QF on 28.02. Two were at Eg on 03~07.03, and three over RW 04.03. One over RW on 18.04, and the last were two over FHP on 24.04. Autumn birds were noted between 08~30.10 at EBR, RW and over Strett. 12 (same birds ?) over the latter two sites on the last date
Tundra Bean Goose	One with Greylag Geese RWNA 20~24.10
Pink-footed Goose	One, FHP 10.01. A 'small flock' over Luff Airfield 02.10, 40 over Oak on 09.10, c.45 flew east over GtCast on 02.11. One RWNA from 08.11~Dec, 6 flew south over Greet GC 13.11
White-fronted Goose	Two with Greylag Geese, BGP 13.10; one RWNA 27.12
Greylag Goose	Large flocks, 189 at FHP on 10.01; 135 at BGP on 23.01; 289 at FHP 03.09, 186 at EBR 19.11. Bred: Chapel Farm (Burl), EBR, FHP, RW
Canada Goose	Large numbers frequented the reservoirs, breeding at RW and EBR. At FHP up to eight were present from 03.01~15.05, no breeding was noted
Barnacle Goose	A summer record of one, with Canada Geese, RWNorm 04.06
Egyptian Goose	Away from RW there were LFP reports in Jan (five birds), Ma, Nov and Dec. Present in Ext Park all year, with five seen 19.02. Ten at FHP 11.09. Bred: RW, Ext Park, Tgh
Shelduck	Present at FHP 10.01~03.07. One or two were at LFP 27.03~09.06, a pair were in BW 17.04 and 04.05, presumably prospecting for a nest site. Bred: RW, EBR
Mandarin Duck	A pair frequented the RWNorm area 14.03~06.06, when they were seen with three young. A pair flew from a wood with a pond at Wg on 05.04 and a pair flew around CottW 13.04. A female and two young were in Ext Park 05.06 and there were 17 by Rygate Lake there on 11.11 – a very high Rutland total. Two at FHP 19.03, and one 05.11
Wigeon	Last noted at FHP on 09.04; one there on 23.07; 115 were on a flooded field at Cott 12.12
Gadwall	Present at the reservoirs and FHP throughout the year, with nos. peaking at FHP with 107 on 21.10. Bred at both reservoirs, and four broods at FHP
Teal	27 on a pond near KQ 13.01. Present at FHP up to 22.04 (max. 46 on 19.02) and from 11.06~end of the year, with 53 on 30.11. Small nos. summered at RW, and up to nine were in Ext Park between Jan~March and Aug~Dec
Green-winged Teal	Singles at BGP 19.01, 05.02, on RWNA from 17.12 to year-end
Mallard	Widespread on waters of all sizes. FHP peak counts 245 on 27.09, 253 on 09.10. Greet GC ponds 44 on 18.12. Breeding records came from both reservoirs, Ext Park, FHP, WFL, Stam Meadows
Pintail	Overwintered at both reservoirs. One at FHP 19.01, and up to six 22.08~30.11; and 12 at RWEgI 10.09
Garganey	A male was at RWEgI between 30.03~11.05, again on 17.06, and as a pair 19.06. RW, autumn birds from 22.07~07.10 with a max. of four on 04.08. One EBR, 26.09
Shoveler	Noted at FHP up to 25.02, with a breeding pair present between 08.04~17.07. Autumn passage was from 22.08, peaking at 45 on 09.10, and birds present to the year-end. Bred: RW. At EBR, mainly from Sept~year-end
Red-crested Pochard	Present at RW from 01.01~ 26.03, with a max. nine on 21.01. One at RWEgl 07.06, the birds were then seen monthly to the end of the year with a peak of seven on 15.12. No records were received from EBR
Pochard	Scarce at FHP with birds noted only from 03.01~ 25.02, peaking at 19 on 24.01. Nine at RWEgI (June), with a brood of six ducklings

Tufted Duck	RW attracted the usual large winter nos. Present at FHP throughout the year with a peak of 77 on 25.03 and one pair breeding. Bred at both reservoirs. Up to four were at Rygate Lake in Ext Park up to 03.06
Scaup	RW 15.01~02.05 with a max. of 4 on three April dates. RW autumn records began with one on 25.08, and up to three present to the end of the year. One at EBR, 29.11~ 03.12
Long-tailed Duck	A moulting male was at RWSA3 on 16.08, remaining to probably 30.10. A female was in NA and SA 30.11~20.12
Common Scoter	A female was in RWSA on 24.01 and NA 11/12.03 with a male noted on 12.04. A female was present at the RWDam and SA from 20.09 to the year-end, 3 noted on 23.11. One was at EBR 28.11
Surf Scoter	A first-winter bird was at RWDam 27~31.12. This is a first record for Rutland of this North American species
Goldeneye	One or two remained at RW into the summer. One at FHP on 23.11, the first there since 2010
Smew	Well reported from both reservoirs in the first winter period. At RW birds were present to 22.03, with a max. of six on 18.03 (including a male). EBR did better, with up to eleven (18.01) and the last on 25.03. The first autumn bird was a redhead at RWSA on 24.11, with up to six noted to the end of the year. EBR had birds from 29.11~ year-end, with a peak of five, including three males, on 30.11
Red-breasted Merganser	EBR single females 01~10.01, and RWNA on 07.04. A male was in RWNA on 23.11
Goosander	Ext Park one male 03.01, one fished R.Welland at Stamford on 23.02, with three there 27.02. Two flew over LFP on 06.01, with three over on 11.02. Our final record was from RWBFP – one on 16.03. Autumn birds were noted at RW in small nos. from 18.11, with five 12.12, and 14 on 18.12
Ruddy Duck	The nationwide cull of this species, in favour of Spanish White-headed Ducks reduced the British population to around 40 birds. It was a surprise to find a female at RW on 30.09, where it remained to the end of the year
Quail	A single record, one calling at MM on 20.05
Red-legged Partridge	Widespread and numerous where birds are released for shooting, as at Exton and EBR. There were no breeding records, the largest covey was c.45 near Hot Hollow Farm, Emp on 30.10
Grey Partridge	Reported numbers were lower this year. Up to three noted at Ext Park, GtCast, Wg Plantation, Prest, Rid, and Wymondham between 08.01~ 28.06. An Ext keeper reported coveys of ten and 20 on the Estate in Oct
Pheasant	Well distributed on farmland with the population maintained by numerous releases
Helmeted Guineafowl	A white bird, and one of normal plumage, fed in an oilseed rape field at Glast Tunnel Top on 15.05
Great Northern Diver	At RW from 01.01~17.05, with a max. of four on the first date and 22.03. A superb summer plumaged bird was in RWNA from at least 05.05 to mid-May. Two were at RW from 20~ 27.11, with a single to at least 18.12
Gannet	A juv. was in RWNA on 28~29.10
Cormorant	Well represented at the reservoirs throughout the year with a flourishing breeding colony at RWBFP. In Aug/ Sept large numbers congregated to exploit shoals of fish fry at RW, especially near the RWDam. Up to three were regular at FHP and Ext Park throughout the year.
Shag	A remarkable influx brought juvs. to RW Dam and NA from $30.08 \sim 17.09$ , with 7 noted 07.09
Bittern	Singles at RWEg3 on 04.01 & 15.02. Autumn birds were present from 05.09 to the year-end, two noted 05.12

Cattle Egret	One flew south over Oak on 22.01
Little Egret	Now to be seen at water bodies throughout the county with records from
g. 01	Banthorpe GP, Tole Mill, FHP, LFP, Holywell Lake (six, 30.11) and both reservoirs. Bred at RW
Great White Egret	This species goes from strength to strength. Up to three were at RWEg up to 15.01, with birds then present from 15.07 to the year-end, increasing to five on 18.12. One over LFP 30.09
Grey Heron	Reported from most watery sites – both reservoirs, BGP, FHP, Ext Park and the R. Welland. Bred at RW. Ten flew south-west over Tin on 15.08
Spoonbill	Nine visited RWEgl briefly on 30.05
Little Grebe	Present at FHP up to 25.03 with a peak of 22 on 24.01. Autumn birds were present from 22.08 to the end of the year (19 present on 15.12). Records also came from both reservoirs (breeding at RW), Ext Park and Holywell Lake.
Great Crested Grebe	Present at both reservoirs, and breeding, throughout the year.
Red-necked Grebe	Singles at RW from the beginning of Jan~12.04, and 23.08~year-end
Slavonian Grebe	One was at EBR from 04. to 3.01 with one at RW from 23.01 to 01.04. Autumn birds were at RW from 18.11~year-end, with singles in NA and SA
Black-necked Grebe	Two were at RWNA to at least 19.01 with three from 02~ 22.03. The first autumn bird returned 05.09, increasing to two on 12.09, and three 07.12~year-end
Red Kite	Well distributed and seen across all parts of Rutland and Stam, where birds have scavenged from bird tables. There was one confirmed breeding record but birds were present and displaying at many woodland sites. Peak nos. were BCF 17 over a field being cut for silage 24.06, and 15 entering a winter roost at CottW on 23.11
Marsh Harrier	Now a regular passage visitor, the first was at RWEgI on 23.02 with other spring records there on four dates to 09.06. Singles were at EBR on 02, and 08.05 and 12.06. Autumn birds were regular at RWEgI from 15.07~ 30.10 with a max. of three on 13.08. Singles were at EBR on 02, 06 and 15.08 and also 08.10
Hen Harrier	A ringtail was at EBR between 08~14.10
Sparrowhawk	A widespread species. Most records were from gardens in Barrow, Bden, Norm, Oak, Stam to the end of March. Display was noted over BW, Ext woodlands and QF with birds regular at RWEgI. Breeding confirmed at FHP
Buzzard	Probably our most common raptor, being widely reported over woodland, open country and settled areas. The peak count of displaying birds was six over TunnW on 14.03 but birds were seen over most other woods. Breeding was confirmed at FHP, WhdC, BW, Ext Park and Mor. Five were over Greet GC, 06.11
Osprey	The first bird returned on 17.03 with the next, at Lynd, 21.03. The Project had a successful year with eight pairs fledging 15 young. RW birds visited LFP, EBR and FHP regularly throughout the summer and two flew over KQ on 05.07. One was at EBR 11.09, our last record was one over BCF, 23.09
Kestrel	Hunting birds were well reported especially from FHP, QF, Ext Park and HM with other records from KQ, Shacklewell, GHW and RWEgI. Nest boxes were successful at Hall Farm, Ext (four young), Westland Wood and RWNA.
Merlin	A male was near GtCast on 01.02, one flew south-west at RWEgl, 26.03
Hobby	Our first record was fairly late – 03.05 at EBR. Throughout May~Aug there were birds at or over Stam, FHP, Glast, HM, LFP and Ext Park. Birds were regular at RWEgI in these months. At HM 20.06, one took prey from a Sparrowhawk. Four were at RWEgI 09.09 with the last seen there 18.09. Final record from Wg, 26.09
Peregrine	Present at a regular breeding site all year. One was over Banthorpe GP on 19.01 and wandering birds were noted at Ext Park (24.04), Wg (10.08), EBR (16.10) and FHP (05.11). At RW birds were noted in March, and from Aug~year-end, with two on 02.09. Many autumn records at Egl were of a large female that fledged at Derby Cathedral.

Water Rail	Most records were in the winter (to 26.02) and from mid-Sept to the year-end. Singles reported at LFP, Geest and FHP. Present at RW throughout the year with breeding in the Egl reed bed.
Moorhen	Common on water bodies throughout the county. FHP numbers peaked at 37 on 14.10, with 27 on Greet GC ponds 13.11, 30.12, and 18.12
Coot	Present on larger ponds, lakes and rivers. Bred at both reservoirs, Ext Park, BGP, FHP and Holywell Lake. Peak nos. occur in winter (113 at FHP on 23.01)
Crane	One flew west over Oak on 15.03, with two north over RWEgI, 08.04
Avocet	One at RWEgI on 11.03 was the first arrival, and a pair (25.03) remained to breed. They had three young on 12.06. Singles were at EBR on 23.03 and 10.06

Feral Pigeon	No counts were received but Oak, Upp and Stam have large populations, as does Castle Cement at Kett
Stock Dove	Seven beneath a Norm bird table 25.02, seven in a Barrow garden 03.03. Single Oak garden on 09.05. Breeding widespread: QF, FHP, Ext Park, KQ, RWEgl. Barn Owl nest boxes were a popular nest site at Geest, Ext Park, Wg and Barrow, and duck boxes at RWEgl. c.40 roosted at Leigh in Nov and Dec
Woodpigeon	A common species of farmland, woodlands and suburban gardens. Autumn migration was noted at Pilt, Leigh and MThorpe between 20.10~ 30.11, with flocks of between 100 and 1550 noted flying south-west on seven dates
Collared Dove	Found mostly in suburban and rural gardens, the peak count was 25 at Belm in Jan
Cuckoo	Our first record was near Ayst on 14.04. Singing birds were heard to 04.06 from ten mainly woodland sites (11 sites last year). All were singles apart from two at CPW and BW. It was unusual to receive a breeding record of a juv. being fed by a Dunnock at Barrow on 04.08.
Barn Owl	Records came in all months from 14 sites (19 last year). Two pairs bred at RW, with single pairs elsewhere fledging broods of two and three.

Kingfisher	Records came from RWLr, RWEgI, EBR, FHP, Ext Park, Ryll, HM (probably bred) and the Oak canal at Tgh
Green Woodpecker	A slight improvement on last year with records from 12 sites compared to ten last year. The most regular sites QF, KQ, GHW and FHP with breeding probable at all.
Great Spotted Woodpecker	Well established in woodlands throughout the county, drumming birds heard at RWNA, WardW, Wg, TunnW, PGW, RWEgl and FHP. Occupied nests were found in BW on 02.04, and 11.06 CottW. Feeders were visited in the first winter period at TunnW and at Barrow and Norm with a family of four there in June. Drumming resumed at RWEgl on 18.12, and TunnW (two birds) 28.12.
Lesser Spotted Woodpecker	One was calling near HambW on 13.03. Between 10.04~14.05 one drummed in BW, also one drummed BarnsW 01.05. It is encouraging that this species is still with us.

Jay	Found in woodlands throughout Rutland, and usually heard before it is seen. Recorded regularly at RWEgI, FHP, Ext Park, BW, PGW, CPW, CQ and Greet GC
Jackdaw	All records were of a roost at GlastW. Between Jan and Feb between 4000 and 6000 were estimated to be present with 900 on 24.07. On 30.11 c.4800 were estimated and 3000/3500 in early Dec. As a breeding bird, Jackdaws were the bane of the nest boxers' life, filling owl and Kestrel boxes with twigs!
Rook	No records were received – it would be valuable to revive our rookery survey
Carrion Crow	No records were received – although remains widespread and common throughout the county
Raven	Ravens are now well established throughout the county, nesting in large trees and on buildings. Most reports were of singles or pairs calling in flight but 14 were seen near Leigh on 24.05, with c.50 in that area during Aug. At least five pairs are known to have bred
Goldcrest	Well distributed in mixed and coniferous woodland. Ten were noted around Leigh on 20.03
Firecrest	One was at RWEgl on 25.03
Blue Tit	A common woodland and garden resident. Up to 16 at a time visited TunnW feeders in Feb
Great Tit	Widespread and common. A pair were breeding 24 feet above the ground in a tree stump at QF in May, an unusually high nest-site.

Coal Tit	Found mainly in conifer woodland but increasingly reported from garden feeders. Regular at TunnW feeders with up to six at any one time over both winter periods.
Willow Tit	There were records throughout the year from the Leigh/LFP area. One was heard near RWGgorse 15~21.01. BCF, one or two present 12.03~07.04. A local and declining species.
Marsh Tit	Well distributed in RW and Ext Park woods with records also from WFL, PC, CQ, Greet GC and BW (where an occupied nest was found on 27.04). One visited feeders in a Man garden in late Jan and up to three were at TunnW feeders in both winter periods.
Bearded Tit	One was at RWEgI reed bed on 09.10, six noted following day.
Skylark	c.120 flew south over RW on 17.01. A widespread breeder on arable land – four were displaying at QF 19.07 (the grassland here being an important habitat for Skylarks throughout the year). 25 were near Barrow 12.10, c.45 over Leigh 17.11, and c.80 MThorpe on ploughed land, 24.11

	Large congregations at LFP, 400 on 21.07, 750 on 26.07, and 300 on 31.07. By 30.08 numbers were down to c.100, but 160 were present 25.09. Oct records for RW Dam, LFP and Pilt, with the last report Pilt, 20.10
House Martin	An early bird flew north at FHP on 25.03, the next being reported at Man 03.04. Few breeding records were received but the Bden birds were well reported, being present from 26.04 (four nests noted). c.350 were near Wg 25.09. The last young left a Man nest 29.09. The last reported were several at RWEgI, 30.09
Cetti's Warbler	Present around the RWEgI lagoons throughout the year with c.11 on territory. One was heard at RWLr 01.06. The 100th RW bird was ringed 18.09, one later being identified at a site away from RW on 16.11
Long-tailed Tit	All our reports came from gardens in Barrow and Oak up to April and in Aug Peak nos. were eight in Oak 01.01, and nine at Barrow 03.03. In the countryside the species appears to have had a good breeding season, but there were no reports of autumn flocks.
Yellow-browed Warbler	One was in EBP on 09~10.10
Wood Warbler	One at RWLr 25.04
Chiffchaff	Overwintering birds were seen at LFP 01.01, Wg 16.01, 19.01, two at Geest sewage works 23.01 & RWEgl 25.02. Spring arrivals were noted from 15.03 at Egl with other March birds at FHP, TunnW, BarnsW, KQ, Leigh, Ext Park. High counts of breeding birds included 27 around Leigh on 08.04, and 60 in BW on 11.04. Other May reports were 30 singing at Leigh on 12.05, and BW – 54 in song 19.05. RW, one or two seen 13.11~25.12, one at Leigh on 01.12
Siberian Chiffchaff	One of this northern race was at Geest sewage works between 21.01~05.02
Willow Warbler	Two reported at RWEgl 02.04 were the first, with 3 at Leigh 05.04, c.30 were around Leigh by 24.04. Generally records (of fewer numbers) from many woodlands. 42 sang around Leigh on 12.05. Our last record was FHP 03.09 – an early date
Blackcap	Singles, a male and a female, were in two Oak gardens between 25/29.02 with a male in a Man garden from 06.02~ end of March. Song was heard at RW Dam on 27.03 and a male was in an Oak garden next day. Breeding birds were widespread by 10.04 with 24 in song around Leigh on 12. 05, and 34 BW on 27.05. Whitethroat	The first arrival was at EBP on 10.04 with the next at RWLr on 13.04. This species continues to thrive with breeding birds widely distributed by the end of April. Nuthatch	Resident in RW, Ext Park Woods, FHP, PC, CPW and BW. Other records from Wg and BarnsG. In winter regular at feeders there and TunnW
Treecreeper	Well distributed in woodlands with Jan, garden records from Wg, Barrow in March
Wren	No significant records received, but at BCF holding 25 territories this year
Starling	Most records were of westerly autumn migration in the Leigh/MThorpe area between 21.10, and 19.11. c. 6400 on 22.10 the highest Oct count. In Nov there were 1870 on 08.11, and c.300 on 19.11
Ring Ouzel	An autumn bird was at Leigh on 03.10
Blackbird	Most reports were of winter birds, when many continental migrants are present. There were 93 around Wg on 14.01, and 43 at Leigh on 26.02. A newly-fledged juv. was in a Stam garden on 28.03. 60 were around Leigh on 08.11, and 52 on 13.11. At RWEgl c.60 noted 20.12. 80 were at Rid on 23.12, with 87 there 27.12
Fieldfare	This species is, appropriately, always well reported. In the winter flocks exceeding 50 were noted by TunnW (60 on 19.01), FHP (100 on 04.02) and LFP (c.300 on 13.02, c.400 on 04.04). One at Leigh on 30.04 was the last bird. The first autumn bird was at RW on 11.10. with 40 at FHP on 14.10 the next arrivals. Robin	No records were received but there were 27 territories at BCF this year, only two below the peak seen 2001/02
Nightingale	One sang at GreetW 23.04. At RWEgI three were in song on 14.05. It is hoped that habitat management will encourage birds to return to this section of the reserve.
Black Redstart	Single females were at Park House, Norm on 13.04 and Whitwell Harbour 03~04.05
Redstart	RWLynd 13.04, EBR 17.04, RWEgl 18.04. There was an excellent autumn passage through LFP/Leigh on 12 dates between 09.08~13.09 (three or four noted 11.09). One was at RWEgl on 30.08
Whinchat	There were spring singles at GHW on 23.04, and EBR on 05.05. Autumn birds were noted between 20.08~18.09 at MThorpe, EBR (six on 06.09), Ext Park (two on 11.09), RWEgI (three on 12.09), FHP and GHW.
Stonechat	In the first winter period, between 04.01~01.03, up to three were at RWEgI, Luff Airfield and EBR. Birds were well reported from 26.09 to the end of the year from Leigh, EBR (5 max 01.10), and at least three at RWEgI 13.11
Wheatear	Spring passage was between 22.03~ 03.05, with birds noted at Luff Airfield (five on 02.04), RWEgI, Dam, Cott Airfield, GtCast, Pick and FHP. Most records were of singles with two at Cott Airfield on 10.04. Autumn singles were noted between 11.08~09.10, at Luff Airfield, GtCast and RWEgI and RWDam
Dunnock	The only records were c.36 at RWEgl on 14.03, and c.50 there 29.03
House Sparrow	31 in an Oak garden 28.03, c.20 at BarnsG 28.03
Tree Sparrow	RWLr is now the key site for this species with birds visiting the feeders throughout the year with c.20 in June and 17 on 24.12. Yellow Wagtail	A single at RW and three at EBR on 02.04 were the first birds. Breeding sites at BCF, BGP, MThorpe, Prest and MM were occupied from 07.05, most subsequent records were of overflying birds at Leigh and RWSA in July and Aug with 15 at Leigh on 24.08. FHP 08.09 – a single and 11 over Leigh. The final record was Wg 24.09
Grey Wagtail	There were records for every month except July, the most regular sites being the reservoirs, FHP, Geest sewage works and Leigh. There were garden records from Oak on 05.01, and Wg 28.10. A pair at FHP, in April and May, were not confirmed breeders. Autumn passage at Leigh was noted between 03.08~18.09, with eight seen 18.09.
Pied Wagtail	No significant records received
White Wagtail	Singles were at EBR 02.04, 04.04. Seven RW Dam 19.04, two at RWEgl 26.04
Tree Pipit	Calling birds were reported over Leigh on 05.04, and on ten dates between 10.08~18.09
Meadow Pipit	Spring birds passed over Leigh on 20.03 (58), TunnW 25.03 (30), and Leigh again on 31.03 (90). Breeding birds were noted at Cott, Luff Airfield, and GHW – from April into July. Six on wires at FHP on 27.08, were the first autumn migrants. Passage was well recorded at Leigh between 11.09~03.10, with peak counts of 190 on 18.09, and 220 on 30.09. On 25.12, c.52 were by RWSA, there were 70 near Norm on 28.12

Doold Dinit	Singles at DWNA 04.10 and the DWDem 08, 00.10. At EBD and noted 16, 20.10
Rock Pipit	Singles at RWNA, 04.10, and the RWDam 08~09.10. At EBR one noted 16~29.10, and one RW, 28.10.
Water Pipit	One at RWEgl between 28.10~03.11, with one in SA, 15.11
Chaffinch	Records in the first winter period were from the finch roost at Leigh with 200 on 08.01, declining to 135 by 28.2, and 50 by 23.03. Breeding nos. at BCF showed no sign of recovery with only nine territories on the CBC plot (eight last year). In 2005 there were 45 territories. At Leigh the roost was monitored from 30.09 (100 birds), increasing to c.260 by 22.12
Brambling	Two were at EBR on 03.01, and one dead in an Oak garden 08.01. The Leigh finch roost was counted from 08.01 (48 present), c.120, presumably passage birds, were counted 23.03, 40 were still using it 10.04. Two or three were at Wg Plantation between 04.01~ 05.02, one was at a Man garden feeder on 12.03. Three were at Westland Wood on 10.04, and the last one was at Leigh 28.10. The first autumn birds were two at Luff Airfield 02.10, with one at EBR on 23.10. Up to ten were noted at EBR, Burl Bushes, HM, Pilt, MThorpe, Rid, Wg and RW to 31.12. The Leigh finch roost again attracted birds from 27.11 (17 birds), with 24 on 11.12, and 20 on 22.12
Greenfinch	At Leigh the roost had c.120 birds throughout Jan. Ten visited Norm feeders on 23.02, with eight at BarnsG on 24.04. Numbers remain low with still only four territories at BCF. Only four visited a Stam garden between Oct and the end of Dec
Goldfinch	This species continues to prosper, especially in gardens where sunflower hearts are a major attraction. 14 were in a Stam garden 09.02. At GHW c.80 fed on burdock and thistles throughout Sept 50 were near PGW on 16.09, and garden nos. then increased with 20 in Oak throughout Oct and 26 at BCF on 10.11
Siskin	Birds were recorded in Stam and Oak gardens from 16.01 to the late date of 06.05, with a peak of six on 28.03 in Oak. A pair in BW on 02.04 may indicate local breeding since four were there on 19.05, and 23.05. Larger flocks were 100 at RWLr 24.01, increasing to 150 on 12.02. Singles were over Leigh 19.06, and Man 22.06. The first autumn bird was one over Leigh on 09.08. Up to 11 were noted over Leigh, Greet GC and EBR to the end of the year with 60 at RW Manton Bay on 27.10, and 50 near LFP on 25.11. On 15.12 c.20 were in BarnsW, and 70 were at RWEgl 20.12
Linnet	c.150 were on game crops at BGP on 21.01. On 20.02 74 arrived to roost in Oak garden, declining to 24 by 07.03 – an unusual suburban record. c.60 were around Leigh on 12.05. Autumn passage over the Chater valley was noted between 23~29.10, with 180 flying south 27.10, and 120 south/south-east 29.10. MThorpe sightings, c.100 on 02.11, 145 two days later, 110 on game crops 26.11. 100 near Rid 23.12
Lesser Redpoll	Between 01.01~06.03 game crops at Leigh attracted up to 120 birds, there were 50 on game crops in Ext Park on 31.01. Sunflower hearts were taken in an Oak garden on 23.01 and 06.03. 12 at RW Man Bay on 28.01, with eight on 25.02, when there were also 200 near PC. One was over BW on 19.04, with up to three over Leigh on several May dates. There were few autumn records; 12 in birch at RWEgl 15.10, c.30 flew over MThorpe on 23.10. One was with Siskins in BarnsW on 15.12
Common Crossbill	Singles flew over Leigh on 03.03 and 19.06, and on 25.06 over Man
Bullfinch	Well distributed in countryside with overgrown hedgerows and scrubby areas. 24 were around Wg on 14.01, with 24 at Leigh on 25.03 and 26 at Leigh on 10.04. Throughout the year pairs and small nos. noted at RWEgI, PC, CPW, HM, EBR, WFL and QF.
Yellowhammer	Flocks noted in the winter periods were 30 near Gt Cast on 09.02, 30 near Walk on 23.01, 35 near PGW on 24.02, 40 at MThorpe on 05.10, and 30 at QF on 17.10. The size of winter flocks has declined alarmingly in recent years and breeding nos. at BCF also give cause for concern.

Fed in a Stam garden 01.01~27.03, max. six 17.01. Well distributed as a breeding bird RWEgl and RWLynd, FHP and fields growing oilseed rape. Birds congregated with other finches and buntings in game crops in autumn – ten at MThorpe 26.11, and 20 at Leigh 10.12

Corn BuntingThree were with Yellowhammers near GtCast on 09.02, with one present 11.02.One reported in Ext Park on 22.04 – the first seen there since 2009.

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
