ORTHOPTERA 2016 Phil Rudkin

Spring and early Summer were both cold and wet which meant that Rutland's Orthopterans got off to a slow start, but by mid-June species strongholds all held good populations.

As before we specifically set out to sweep parts of the County where species had not previously been reported. By the end of the season Richard Brown had a further 23 tetrads coloured-in. The map below shows occupation density by species.

Slender Groundhopper started the survey-season off (27.04), with a new colony found in Burley Woods •.

Barrow village, near Cottesmore was visited mid-September. In nearby Market Overton • Lesser Marsh Grasshopper and Roesel's Bush Cricket were new finds.

Two full surveys were undertaken of the Egleton Reserve. Late in the season (10.10) the area around the Volunteer Training Centre ● and the banks around Lagoon 4 ● were surveyed for the first time. Huge numbers of Roesel's Bush Crickets, Longwinged Coneheads were found, together with a few Lesser Marsh and Meadow Grasshoppers still active but very quiet, in the lush bank grasses. A first-time survey of Skylark Meadow ●, a private field on the Reserve, also found these species. Nearby very large numbers of Speckled Bush Crickets were detected stridulating in old mixed hedgerows.

The final stridulating heard in Rutland (13.11) were six Speckled Bush Crickets, in Hawthorn hedges at Walk Farm, Great Casterton. Jenny Harris found the season's last species (22.11), a torpid-looking female Oak Bush Cricket on Bramble, at Ketton Quarries.

Following up on my opening remarks of last year none of the hoped-for Cambridgeshire or Northants species were sighted in County in 2016.



Number of Orthoptera species identified within individual tetrads, 2016



Short-winged Conehead, Conocephalus dorsalis

Well established around Rutland Water




RWEgl visit (05.10) found 5 small, and 3 large colonies, South-East of BWC

Speckled Bush Cricket, Leptophyes punctatissima

Widespread and common, best found using bat-detector (35kHz)





Common Groundhopper, Tetrix undulata

Under-recorded and overlooked.

A tiny creature with very effective camouflage!


Hard to observe, as it does not fly.

No stridulating mechanism; therefore cannot be picked up on bat-detectors.

Due to tiny size, and no stridulating mechanism is under-recorded



Widespread but uncommon






